


Survey Methodology and District Map

The SoHo Broadway 2024 Community Survey was conducted between May and October 2024 and was disseminated through the SoHo Broadway Initiative newsletter, Community Board 2 newsletter, direct emails to stakeholders, our website and social media, and in-person visits to retail stores. The initial version of the survey did not contain an option to select N/A for certain questions, so that version was closed and a new version was created. The results of the two surveys were combined and analyzed using Python and Excel.




The survey also implemented several measures to weed out bot respondents, including disqualifying questions at the beginning and end of the survey that were displayed as image files which bots would be challenged to interpret. Staff members reviewed responses individually to eliminate any bot responses that slipped through security measures, evaluating the coherence of short answer responses.

Appendix B "How often do you come to SoHo Broadway?"






"What is your opinion of SoHo Broadway Initiative's work?"






- Midtown and Meatpacking retail district are very clean, no trash or graffiti.


"What can SoHo Broadway Initiative do to improve its sanitation program?"




"Compared to other busy NYC neighborhoods, the sidewalks in SoHo are:" (congested/uncongested)






Broken down by respondent group

Broken down by respondent group




